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Introduction


Notes that can be played on the Trova

The notes shown below can be played by varying how you blow and the shape of your mouth and lips. These are the same notes that can be played on a standard Bb trumpet without pressing any of the valves.


The upper staff shows the notes as they would appear on a piano score, while the lower staff shows the same notes as they would appear on a Bb trumpet score.

In this guidebook all notes are written as shown on the lower staff (in Bb).

Trumpet or Trova score in Bb




Demo 1: Natural Harmonics – With Accompaniment



Introduction

The first note: A long low “C” ~ Long Tones ~

Play a long tone as shown in the example below.



1 2 3 4 “Puh”

Repeat this a number of times


Get a feel for the tempo as you count “1, 2, 3”, inhale on “4”, then blow into the mouthpiece with your lips together on the first beat of the next measure to play the note. You should be blowing through about the center of your lips.

* Don't use your tongue yet.

Repeat this exercise until you can play the note at the intended timing.

Puh


Gently stretch your lips sideways as if you were smiling and buzz them.



If you're having trouble producing sound ...

Are your lips too tight?

Your lips should be relaxed and free to vibrate, and you only need to blow gently. Place the mouthpiece against your lips with your upper and lower front teeth providing support from behind the lips. Separate your upper and lower front teeth a little to provide a narrow passage for your breath.



Shorter notes ~ Tonguing ~

Once you can play long notes, it is time to learn how to play shorter notes in tempo. The “tonguing” technique uses your tongue to shorten the notes as needed.




1 2 3 4 -and “ta”


Get a feel for the tempo as you count “1, 2, 3”, inhale on the first half of “4”, then position your tongue against the back of your front teeth ready to play on the second half of “4” (the “and” half). Move your tongue away from your teeth a little as if pronouncing “ta” to play the first note.

Add more short notes as you get used to doing this.


Basic Exercises

The second note: “G” ~ Lip Slur & Tonguing ~

Let’s learn a new note! Different notes are played by changing the way you blow and the space inside your mouth. This technique is known as “lip slur.”

To begin, try saying “a” and “i” without using your instrument. Notice how the position of your tongue, the way your breath emerges, and the space inside your mouth change. Now let’s try making the same sounds while blowing the instrument.

Mouth shape diagram



“a” as in
“art”

“i” as in
“bit”

Lip slur & tonguing example 1



Slur Symbol

Notes covered by the slur symbol are to be played without tonguing.

Play while positioning your tongue and shaping your mouth as if you were pronouncing the sounds without actually “saying” the sounds.

1 2 3 4-and “ta, i, a, i, ta, ti, ta, ti, ta~”

Now try playing “G” both as a long tone and with tonguing as we learned on pages 2 and 3.

When you’ve learned how to play the “G” note, try playing it along with accompaniment.

Demo 3: Example 1 – Demo + Accompaniment Only



The third note: middle “C” ~ Lip Slur & Tonguing ~

Now let’s add a middle “C” note to the two notes we’ve learned so far and add “e” to our “a” and “i” mouth shapes.

Mouth shape diagram



“e” as in “wet”

Lip slur & tonguing example 2



Use the “e” or “te” mouth shape to play the “G” note in this example.

Lip slur & tonguing example 3



Now try playing middle “C” both as a long tone and with tonguing as we learned on pages 2 and 3.

When you’ve learned how to play the middle “C” note, try playing it along with accompaniment.

Advanced Exercises

The fourth note: “E” ~ Lip Slur & Tonguing ~

Use the “a”, “e”, and “i” mouth shapes to play even higher.

Use the “e” or “te” mouth shape to play the “G” and middle “C” notes in this example.

Lip slur & tonguing example 5



This example is a good way to practice skipping notes.
When you’ve learned how to play the “E” note, try playing it along with accompaniment.

The fifth note: higher “G” ~ Lip Slur & Tonguing ~

Use the “a”, “e”, and “i” mouth shapes to play up to the higher “G” note.

When you’ve learned how to play the higher “G” note, try playing it along with accompaniment.

* The lip slur mouth (pronunciation) shapes we have introduced in this guidebook are just examples, and a good place to start. As you become used to playing the instrument you will be able to find mouth shapes that produce the most beautiful sounds for your own physique and style.


